Election Information

The qualifying period to run for office in Wilton Manors is Monday, June 8 (12 p.m.) through Friday, June 12 (12 p.m.) The City will elect a Mayor (a 2-year term) and two Commissioners (4-year terms). Candidates must have resided in the city for 6 months prior to qualifying and be a registered voter. Call the City Clerk’s Office at 954-390-2123 for more information.

Early voting in the General Primary Election will be at City Hall August 8-16 (the primary election day is Tuesday, August 18).

General Election Early Voting is October 19—November 1 at City Hall and the General Election Day is Tuesday, November 3, from 7 a.m.—7 p.m. at your Local Election Precinct.

SCHEDULE FOR BULK TRASH AND RECYCLING

If your regular garbage pickup days are **Monday & Thursday**, your bulk trash days are:

Thursday, May 21 Thursday, June 18 Recycling Day: Thursday

If your regular garbage pickup days are **Tuesday & Friday**, your bulk trash days are:

Tuesday, May 19 Tuesday, June 16 Recycling Day: Friday

If your regular garbage pickup days are **Wednesday & Saturday**, your bulk trash days are:

Wednesday, May 20 Wednesday, June 17 Recycling Day: Wednesday

Condominium bulk pickup (quarterly): Saturday, June 27



PLEASE NOTE: Bulk pickup is NOT scheduled for a particular week of the month (such as the third week of the month), but varies from month to month—so it's important to mark your calendar for the actual date each month.

SPRING CLEANING IN THE ISLAND CITY

If you're inspired to freshen up your home and garden this spring, then you'll mostly likely be clearing out the old to make way for the new...and that means throwing things away. While doing so, remember there are **SIX** ways to dispose of those old belongings:

Trash

The most common method is by placing common household trash street-side on your regularly scheduled, twice-weekly garbage pick-up days. Every-day items as well as those boxes of worn out old toys, clothing and nick-knacks you've been storing or not using can go into your **BLUE** trash bin. "When In Doubt, Throw It Out!"...Wilton Manors' trash is disposed of at a waste-to-energy plant that makes electricity, not land-fill mounds!

Recycle

Recycling is a great, environmentally friendly way to dispose of those boxes of old magazines you haven't been reading. Additionally, weekly items such as newspapers, junk mail, rinsed-out juice bottles, glass jars, soda cans, and tin cans should be placed in your **GREEN** recycling bin, and will be picked up once a week on your scheduled pick-up day. Remember...no plastic bags or food residue!

Bulk

For cleaning out the garage, disposing of old appliances, or trimming the landscape, place these old items street-side on your once-a-month bulk pick-up day. Be sure to place old mirrors and glass inside a closed box or sealed container before setting outside.

Household Hazardous Waste

The city has contracted with Waste Management to pick up your HHW through the At-Your-Door service. This is a customized pick-up for items such as paint cans, old cleaning solutions and electronics. You must call at least 10 days in advance in order to ensure timely pick-up for this once-a-month service.

Shredding

For confidential paper items needing destruction, the city hosts a shredding event through Waste Management twice a year at the City Hall/Hagen Park parking lot. Keep your eyes open for shredding event dates for destroying those old documents.

Donating

Finally, for those gently used items that are not ready to be cast off, there are numerous charities and thrift stores in and around our community that will gladly re-purpose clean clothing, toys, fixtures, and furniture that you drop-off.

WATERING SCHEDULE


Residents and businesses are limited to a two-day-per-week landscape irrigation schedule with two "watering windows". NO lawn watering is allowed between 7:00 a.m. and 7:00 p.m. any day of the week. Code Compliance is issuing citations for violations of the water usage schedule.

Justin Stuart Flippen was born on May 6, 1978 in Hollywood, Florida. He loved experiencing nature's beauty, and visited all 50 states by the time he was 40. At the age of just 41, Mayor Flippen died unexpectedly of a brain aneurysm suffered in route to the City Commission meeting of Tuesday, February 25, 2020.

His love of public service, fostered by community involvement as a Boy Scout, fully emerged in high school, when he participated in the American Legion's Boys State government program. Justin was a graduate of Coconut Creek High School, Broward College, and Florida Atlantic University. At FAU, he served in many capacities in student government, including Student Body President, becoming Florida's first openly-gay student body president, as well as serving as an intern for U.S. Senator Bob Graham. Justin's activism as a young adult extended beyond the campus and into our community as Vice President of the Tri-City Democratic Club of Wilton Manors, Oakland Park, and Fort Lauderdale.



Vice Mayor Tom Green—COVID-19 Insights



Wilton Manors, like the rest of the world, has had to deal with this pandemic. As Vice-Mayor I have participated in many conference calls with most of the mayors throughout the county to help craft a WM response to this virus that is proper and similar to that of other cities in Broward. Because of our small size I have been reluctant to support emergency orders that are greatly different than those of large nearby cities. From the beginning I've been working to coordinate with Fort Lauderdale.

The first emergency order issued in Wilton Manors was the result of decisions reached at our March 10th commission meeting. It reduced occupancy in most of our businesses and delegated emergency powers to the City Manager for city operations until April 30th. I signed the order on March 12th.

The second emergency order issued for the city, 2020-02, was very similar to that of Fort Lauderdale and Oakland Park. This order closed bars and gyms, and restricted restaurants to takeout service. It limited any type of public gathering. The coordination of municipal orders was necessary because Broward County was reluctant to provide countywide guidance. After Broward mayors put pressure on the county, a countywide emergency order was finally approved by the Broward Commission. The county order provides for more clarity of the rules throughout Broward.

The state of Florida was slow to issue orders to deal with Covid-19. Eventually the Governor issued such orders after much criticism by media. He closed many businesses and all the beaches (some of which have been reopened). The Governor does not do much without first consulting with the President. We know that Trump discounted any danger from this disease until recently. He now holds incessant “news conferences” that provide little information that is new or true. And he often changes it the next day.

The City has continued to function under difficult circumstances. The City Commission met remotely on April 28th. The meeting was necessary to provide an extension of emergency powers to the City Manager and other items for the operation of the city. The members of our Police Department continue to serve along with health care workers and fire emergency personnel on the front lines of this epidemic. City staff, especially the City Manager, continue their extraordinary work for our safety and well-being. Much of the work is now done remotely. This has made some work, such as permit inspections, particularly challenging.

The COVID-19 Virus has made it necessary to curtail many services to our residents. Parks and the library have been closed. Civic meetings and city board meetings have been cancelled. The Stonewall Celebration has been postponed until, perhaps December 6th, 2020. The pandemic has had a serious impact on city finances and this is already being reviewed for adjustments and cuts. There has been a devastating financial effect throughout WM. Many of our small businesses will not survive. Most employees have gone through incredible hardships. Please make use of local restaurant take-out and delivery. Tip generously if you can. Make a donation to an employee relief fund. Thank the employees in our grocery stores.

After local, county, and state emergency orders, we are all aware of the “Safer At Home” guidelines. And we know how dangerous crowds are, even in our own homes. We need to wear face masks. On April 10th Wilton Manors, Broward County, and Fort Lauderdale all issued emergency orders that “strongly urge” face coverings when outside our homes. And please dispose of masks and gloves in appropriate receptacles. Happy hour with your friends on Zoom is not that bad!

After a much greater increase in testing perhaps we can begin to think more of the future. Eventually we can discuss a phased approach to reopening our economy and city. Some services and small businesses might cautiously be opened. Perhaps our parks could be opened on a limited schedule. Restaurants might be able to operate on a reduced occupancy. Waiters would probably have to wear masks. Bars and pubs will be more of a challenge. But we need to do this safely and sanely. We can't listen to protestors demanding that America be reopened. We need to remember that life is not going to be the same for a long, long time.

Thanks to all of our residents that have acted appropriately and have stayed at home as much as possible. Thanks to the Feeding South Florida organization for partnering with Wilton Manors, Fort Lauderdale, and Oakland Park to provide for a food distribution event on April 17th. And thanks to the volunteers who worked that day.

Be patient and be kind and please complete your Census2020 survey!!!

The mayors and municipal managers of our county are working with the Broward County Commission to coordinate all efforts aimed at any reopening of additional businesses or services in Southeast Florida. Broward County will work with Miami-Dade, Palm Beach, and Monroe counties in this effort. It should be an interesting project.

Commissioner Julie Carson—Adversity, Gratefulness and Recovery



Boxer Manny Pacquiao sets up with a jab, then throws a punch, followed by a hook, all of which land with stunning accuracy, bellowing the breath out of an opponent who surrenders to the mat in agony.

Over the last months, I feel like I have been in the ring with the great fighter, Pacquiao. I am still grieving the death of my dear friend, Justin Flippen whose counsel, humor, kindheartedness, and integrity were attributes that gave me hope for the future and a sense of connectedness in my community. Justin and I shared a common goal of weaving residents and stakeholders into the fabric of community life. His Celebration of Life was a beautiful event of which he would be proud.

In the next months, the City will explore ways that we can honor Justin’s legacy in a more formal way. In the weeks after Justin’s death, the Coronavirus epidemic began taking our Island City and the world hostage. There was initially no unified Federal, State or local response to the pandemic, but City Manager Henderson and her team worked tirelessly to ensure that municipalities operated in tandem to deliver county-wide uniformity in messaging and guidelines by enacting Emergency Orders that were comprehensive and consistent with emerging CDC guidelines. Even though City Hall is closed to the public, Wilton Manors is diligent in pursuing all educational, mitigation, and enforcement mechanisms to safeguard the health and safety of residents, business owners, and stakeholders during this crisis. City Administration and elected officials are working to field questions, protect vulnerable populations, solve problems, and collaborate to determine a path forward that supports the economic vitality and personal richness of Wilton Manors.

I cannot provide a definitive scope of our City’s response in the aftermath of this pandemic, but I can share that we will, as a familial unit, emerge stronger than before. I leave you with the words of Nelson Mandela.

“I have walked that long road to freedom. I have tried not to falter; I have made missteps along the way. But I have discovered the secret that after climbing a great hill, one only finds that there are many more hills to climb. I have taken a moment here to rest, to steal a view of the glorious vista that surrounds me, to look back on the distance I have come. But I can only rest for a moment, for with freedom come responsibilities, and I dare not linger, for my long walk is not ended.”

Commissioner Gary Resnick-Wilton Manors Responses to COVID-19: Days Matter!



Relatively early, Wilton Manors made efforts to keep our employees and community safe during the deadly COVID-19 outbreak. It's been challenging for Wilton Manors and other cities. With 20+ years serving as Mayor/Commissioner, I have been involved in many emergencies and recessions, but nothing like this. The City has an emergency plan that serves us well in these difficult times.

Normally in a crisis that affects large areas, we would look to the federal government or Governor for leadership. This is particularly true in a health crisis, as cities do not employ scientists and medical professionals to guide policy and emergency decisions. In this case however, the reverse has been true. The President and Governor have not provided guidance for local governments in a timely manner; instead they are largely leaving it to cities and counties to make difficult decisions to protect lives. They didn't even stop cruise ships but then wouldn't let them dock after people died or caught the virus. Days matter now!

This is largely why I requested in early March that the Commission hold a special meeting. Even holding the "meeting" was difficult, since we have only 4 Commissioners, one was required to self-quarantine, and FL law requires a quorum of 3 persons be present. Despite our pressing, the Governor did not authorize virtual meetings until he issued Executive Order 20-69 on March 20. Days matter now.

At the March 16, emergency meeting, there were some things we agreed on easily: (1) cancel all meetings until mid-April; 2) delegate authority to the City Manager to take emergency actions without calling a Commission meeting unless Commissioners objected; 3) suspend liens and fines; and order that gyms, bars and restaurants (except for take out and delivery), would be limited to 50% of capacity or no more than 50 persons (whichever was less). At the time we met, I was in favor of closing gyms, bars and restaurants, as was one other member of the Commission; however, Commissioner Carson would only agree to the reduction to 50% capacity. Fortunately Commissioner Green joined with Commissioner Rolli and myself to outvote her to limit them to 50 persons. The next day was St. Patrick's Day. Imagine if bars had hundreds of people partying on St. Patrick's Day.

We indicated we wanted to follow the lead of the County, but Broward determined that unlike Miami-Dade, it did not have authority at the time to close businesses within cities. The next day the City of Fort Lauderdale closed all gyms, bars and restaurants (except for take out). We followed suit. It took the Governor until March 20, to order this. **DAYS MATTER!**

The actions taken by the City are not designed to create hardship; they are what the majority of us feel are the most appropriate steps to protect lives in our community. At this point, we all know someone who has COVID-19 or worse, died from the virus, or is on the front lines working in health care, pharmacies or supermarkets. My niece is an ER DR responsible for intubating patients. These people are not risking their lives so people can engage in non-essential activities or shop in non-essential businesses. Common sense has to prevail. Please join me in thanking these workers and our own police, fire, EMS, utilities and others who support us!

With stay at home orders, I walk my dog often and see many residents, walking, jogging and bicycling. At a distance, we converse and ask what we can do for each other. It is good to see so many people weathering this storm in a positive manner. This is what life in our town is all about, the people, the friendliness and willingness to help one another; that's life in Wilton Manors. There has never been a better time to be a good neighbor!

We are all in this together and we will get through this together and be a stronger and healthier community. I want to thank all the residents, businesses, city staff and our First Responders for helping one another.

NOTIFICATIONS OF EMERGENCY SITUATIONS

Don't forget to tune in your radio to **AM1630** before, during and after a storm for updates from the City of Wilton Manors and the National Weather Service.

Also subscribe to Broward County's free Emergency Update E-mail System, visit www.broward.org/hurricane and click on "Alert!Broward Signup" under Things To Know. The system provides residents with important information from the Broward County Emergency Operations Center before, during and after a hurricane.

BE PREPARED

HURRICANE PREPAREDNESS CHECKLIST

It is **YOUR** responsibility to be sure you are prepared. Make sure you have the following items BEFORE a storm hits:

- FOOD:** Non-perishable packaged or canned food supplies for 5-7 days, and a manual can opener. Don't forget a 5-7 day supply of special needs items for babies such as formula, food, wipes, diapers; special foods for the elderly; toiletries and extra toilet paper
- WATER:** Minimum of 3 gallons of drinking water per person; preferably one gallon per person per day for two weeks. Extra water is needed for food preparation and personal hygiene. To store drinking water, use food-grade containers such as clean, airtight two-liter soda jugs. If you re-use disposable plastic bottles, do not keep them for more than a month
- First aid supplies and prescription medications for 2 weeks*
- Waterproof tarps and/or plastic sheeting
- Plastic trash bags and ties; extra re-sealable plastic storage bags, heavy-duty aluminum foil and disposable aluminum pans
- Paper goods such as plates, bowls, napkins, towels, and plastic eating utensils
- Protective clothing, rainwear, bedding or sleeping bags
- Mosquito repellent with DEET, and sunscreen
- Tool kit including cord, rope, hammer, wood nails, saw, hatchet or axe, crowbar, chainsaw blades, tarp, duct tape, and heavy work gloves
- Batteries
- Battery-powered radio, flashlight, clock
- Unscented bleach (and a medicine dropper), soap, detergent
- Hand sanitizer
- Extra charcoal or propane gas for outdoor cooking
- Matches in a waterproof container
- Fire extinguisher (ABC type)
- Full gas tank
- Cash (ATMs won't work during a power outage)
- A simple corded telephone
- Fully charged cell phone with a car charger accessory
- Pet supplies
- A designated out-of-town contact for family and friends
- A list of important phone numbers (doctors, insurance agents, etc.)
- Protected, waterproof storage area for important documents (insurance, property deed, etc.)
- Waterproof tarps and plastic sheeting
- Learn how to turn off electricity, gas and water, if advised to do so

If you will be using a portable generator at home, search "Generator Safety" on the City's website for guidelines about the proper preparation and use of portable generators.

Protect your property and neighborhood. Prior to the hurricane season, take advantage of monthly bulk pick-up services and remove loose belongings and debris outside your home, and properly trim over grown landscape. Waiting until after an event may hinder clean-up efforts by overloading facilities and resources!

Quick Tip: * Prepare ahead of time for your medical needs such as dialysis, insulin, oxygen, and any prescription drugs. The emergency refill law now allows you to obtain a 30-day supply of medications when an emergency is declared. Contact your pharmacy for details on your prescriptions.

BE SAFE

HAVE A PLAN

Know where you will be during a hurricane event. Discuss action plans with family and friends, plan for special needs family members, plan for your pets, gather your supplies and protect your assets. Whether you plan to stay at home or evacuate to a safe location, make sure you can properly secure your home. Pay attention to evacuation notices. If you think you may need a shelter or have special needs, visit www.broward.org/hurricane and click on the "Registrations", "Residents At Risk" and "Shelters" links. Verify whether or not these facilities can accommodate your needs.

BROWARD COUNTY'S VULNERABLE POPULATION REGISTRY

Broward County has a Vulnerable Population Registry for residents who are at risk due to disability, frailty or health issues, regardless of age, who elect to stay at home in the event of a hurricane or other emergency. The Registry is a partnership between Broward County and municipalities to help emergency responders better plan for recoveries from hurricanes and other emergencies. It **is not** a guarantee of assistance.

After a hurricane or other emergency, residents may experience prolonged power and phone outages. Residents may not be able to leave their apartments to get assistance because the elevators are not functioning, or to let others know that they are in need. Municipalities use the Registry to help evaluate resident needs and to assist in planning their response in an emergency. While registering in the database **is not** a guarantee that you will be provided services or placed on a priority list for responders, it will help responders be better prepared to meet resident needs in a recovery.

Don't wait for an emergency, register early! You can register online at www.broward.org/AtRisk and select "Vulnerable Population Registry" or by calling the Broward County Call Center at 311 or 954-831-4000 (TTY 954-831-3940). All the information provided will be held in strictest confidence as required by State law.

Florida Emergency Bridge Loan

Governor DeSantis has activated the Florida Small Business Emergency Bridge Loan Program that provides short-term, interest free loans of up to \$50,000 to small businesses impacted by COVID-19. Business owners in Florida with two to 100 employees are eligible. The application period ends May 8, 2020.

Don't Knock When You Can Call

As we travel through this health and financial crisis (*and hopefully exit the crisis soon*) here are some things to consider for the near future: The Wilton Manors Police Department continues to serve our community unabated! We have adjusted work schedules, days of work and hours of work for our personnel; all in an effort to minimize our exposure to each other and to the public at large. We **MUST** think and act long term knowing that we are in a marathon; not a sprint. We are not engaged in a popularity contest; we are public servants dedicated to serving our community in a capacity others will not (or cannot).

Here are some of the things we have put in place from early March forward to the present:

- ✓ We have authorized the expansion of phone reporting for delayed calls for service when we can achieve the same investigative and reporting goals. Officers will call the reporter via phone in these cases in lieu of responding to the scene.
- ✓ Citizens we meet with may be asked to meet in “open air” areas.
- ✓ Department members may stand a minimum six (6) feet away from those with whom they are speaking.
- ✓ Officers may wear masks and gloves, and in certain instances they have been directed to wear these universal precautions.
- ✓ Our attendance at community meetings and social events have been cancelled and/or postponed. In lieu of this, we have begun videoconferencing with leaders from our neighborhood and business associations to maintain adequate lines of communication.
- ✓ The public is not allowed access into the secure confines of our police station or sub-stations.
- ✓ Fingerprinting services have been suspended until further notice.
- ✓ All non-essential activities/classes have been suspended until further notice.

The above are just some operational adjustments we have made in our endeavor to maintain and sustain and healthy workforce. What remains unchanged is our agency’s commitment to respond to emergency calls for service, incidents that just occurred and other priority incidents that necessitate our response. We will respond to the scene of these calls as usual.

COVID-19 in perspective: no doubt there will be an increase in the “C-19” numbers in the U.S. (both in fatalities and those who contract the virus) and many will react emotionally. Here are some interesting numbers from Italy: **As of early March** Italy published the following statistics: over 1,000 people have died in Italy: Percentage of deaths by age group: 90+ years old: **6% of deaths**; 80 - 89 years old: **42% of deaths**; 70 - 79 years old: **35% of deaths**; 60 - 69 years old: **16% of deaths**. Bottom line: *99% of all deaths are for people aged 60 or over*. Interestingly, few to any deaths of been reported in Africa, South America, Mexico or Central America. Hopefully this *may be* a sign that higher temperatures help offset the spread of this virus although it is too soon to tell for sure. WMPD will continue its efforts to provide heightened service and security to the vulnerable members of our community.


From a financial perspective please consider this:

We need you --- to complete the 2020 Decennial Census!

It's Not Too Late!

During the first three weeks of March 2020, you should have received a postcard from the U.S. Census Bureau. The postcard has a unique household identifier that allows you to respond to the census via the internet or telephone. Federal law requires that the personal information you submit be kept confidential and secure.

A complete and accurate count is critical for Wilton Manors because the results of the 2020 Census will affect how much funding we receive from federal programs over the next decade. Every year, billions of dollars in federal funding go to hospitals, fire departments, schools, roads, and other resources based on census data. For this reason, responding to the census is a civic duty that is required by law. The U.S. Constitution, Article 1, Section 2, mandates that the country conduct a count of its population once every 10 years. The 2020 Census will mark the 24th time that the country has counted its population since 1790.

The results of the Census also determine the number of seats each state will have in the U.S. House of Representatives, and they are used to draw congressional and state legislative districts. Three congressional seats were gained in Florida after the last census, and that translates into empowerment.

Children, immigrants, and other at-risk communities are always in danger of being undercounted, so pass the word along to your friends and neighbors. Completing the Census survey is safe – and it is vitally important for you and your community! **[You can also complete the Census by calling: 844-330-2020.](tel:844-330-2020)**
