Vice Mayor Paul Rolli Transit Service



On June 14th, the City Commission approved a micro-transit transportation program to transport residents and visitors within the City of Wilton Manors. This service, provided by Circuit Transit Inc., includes short-distance on-demand electric vehicle services aimed at relieving congestion and parking issues. Pick up services would be for residents and visitors from a residence, hotel or other local attraction for transport to and from points of interest within the City. We expect the service to begin within the next 90 -120 days. The service will be funded from parking, advertising, and fare revenue and will offer a flat fare of \$2.00 per rider per ride. It will operate Sunday - Thursday 11a.m. to 9p.m. & Friday and Saturday 11a.m. to 11p.m.

Circuit Transit Inc. is an active service provider in Broward County and uses all electric, first/last mile solutions that help move people in local communities. Circuit is the largest and most experienced operator of these kinds of services in the 20 plus markets across the US. In South Florida, Circuit operates in Fort Lauderdale, Pompano Beach, Hollywood, West Palm Beach, Palm Beach and Miami, as well as a forty (40) plus car dedicated service with Brightline Trains in West Palm Beach, Fort Lauderdale and Miami.

We need to thank the City Manager and staff for their innovative thinking and doing the related research. This service also meets many Strategic Initiative Environmental and Sustainability Goals.

Commissioner Chris Caputo—Demonstrating Fiscal Responsibility



The approval of the new city-wide electric shuttle option is exciting for several reasons. Not only is it convenient, and green, it's also being funded in a very fiscally responsible way. The new Circuit shuttle program is funded entirely from revenue in our city's parking fund, not by your ad valorem taxes. Whenever a resident or visitor pays for parking at a city operated parking lot, the revenue generated stays within the parking fund. It can only be used for transportation and parking related purposes. In this case, the new electric vehicle shuttle program is a great use of the parking fund dollars. We're going to be able to offer this service without raising parking rates.

Our city has once again begun its annual budget process. This involves multiple workshops and meetings, a tremendous amount of effort from our resident volunteers on our budget committee, as well as herculean staff efforts led by our Finance Director, Pennie Zuercher. This year, we will once again focus heavily on ensuring our long-term infrastructure needs are properly funded. One way we are continuing to ensure fiscal responsibility in this area is by reducing the amount of money transferred from the utility fund to the city's general operation fund. It is my belief that this money should be used to reduce resident utility bills or cover infrastructure projects, only.

Commissioner Mike Bracchi—Here to Serve and Represent You!

Roadway and Transportation Projects

There are a number of city roadway projects happening this summer, including:

- 1.) Improved pedestrian and bicycle facilities on NW 29th Street between Andrews Avenue and Powerline Road. Construction is expected to begin in the fall.
- 2.) Design improvements to NE 26th Street between Dixie Highway and the Middle River.
- 3.) Trees are coming to Wilton Drive!

The city commission just approved a Shuttle Service within our city limits. More information on this coming soon.

Economic Development & Revitalization

The changes to the city code made last year to promote redevelopment are starting to pay off. There have been a number of meetings with real estate developers and city staff to revitalize a handful of properties across our commercial corridors. Prior to any redevelopment, there will be numerous public meetings for residents to express support or concern about any particular project. Additionally, for any project to be approved, a number of studies must be conducted, including traffic studies, shadow studies, water and sewer capacities, park capacities, and more.

Some of the commercial properties that have expressed interest in redevelopment include:

- 1.) the property located on the SE corner of Andrews Avenue and Oakland Park Blvd;
- 2.) the property located where the old Andrew's Diner existed;
- 3.) the Shoppes on Wilton Drive (only interested in redeveloping one-half of the property along NE 7th Ave and Wilton Drive);
- 4.) the property on NE 26th Street where Holy Mackerel sits; and
- 5.) the property on NE 26th Street and 15th Ave where the church used to exist.

Annual Budget

Lastly, budget season is upon us. City staff is currently working on the budget and there will be a number of public meetings where you can voice your opinion on the tax rate and how we spend our tax dollars. Public meetings with the city commission will take place in the City Commission Chambers beginning at 6:30p.m. on the following dates:

Wednesday, July 27—Second Budget Workshop (the First Budget Workshop was held on Tuesday, June 21)

Tuesday, August 23—Third Budget Workshop

Wednesday, September 14—First Public Hearing on Proposed Budget and Millage Rate

Commissioner Gary Resnick– The City’s Economic Development Plan Relies on New Apartment Complexes



Last year, the City Manager, Development Director, and City Commission supported new zoning regulations to allow dense, tall apartment complexes to be built. I opposed these changes for a few reasons: (1) density of 60 units/acre (as opposed to existing max of 25) was too dense; (2) the height allowed, up to 8 stories or 90 feet in some areas, was too tall; and (3) our infrastructure (water & drainage systems, roads, parks, fire and police services) could not handle such an increase in demand and traffic. More significantly, I was concerned that the new zoning regulations would result in prioritizing large apartment complexes to the exclusion of office and other commercial projects.

Well, that’s what’s happening. In the west, there’s a large complex with 186 apts planned on Andrews by Oakland Park Blvd., and a 20-unit townhome project on the Andrews Diner site; in the city center, a very large 320 unit apt complex on 26th in the plaza containing Lotus/Best Cellar/Holy Cross/Holy Mackerel, and others, and 190 apts behind it where eclectic Alchemist and others are located, and a large complex with 252 apts planned for the Shoppes on Wilton Dr.; and east, 250 apartments at 26th & 15th where Science of the Mind was. There is no doubt that the city’s property tax base will increase (not to mention that developers will make huge profits).

Is this too much? We certainly hope that our systems and traffic can handle increasing our residential units by 15-20%, adding 1,000+ apartments. As presented by our Economic Development Manager, virtually all will be high-end, market rate, eliminating fears that affordable rentals will take over the city. For the most part, Wilton Manors is and will remain an expensive place to live.

The planned construction requires existing structures to be demolished, resulting in long term businesses and those planning to open, losing leases and having to close or relocate. Hopefully, the city’s Economic Development Department can help them find new locations in the city or nearby. And some of these complexes will include commercial space for cafes and other small businesses.

Where will all these renters work? With the city being built out, there will not be many opportunities for regional headquarters, office buildings, and the like, that would have supported a day-time economy and jobs. But these were the policy decisions of the City Manager, staff, and Commission. Certainly, with the present economy, it is far easier to rely on developers building apartments to increase a city’s tax base, than to lure major employers, and Florida seems to have an ever-increasing need for rental units, especially with the many retirees moving here.

In addition, with code requirements for green space, the city should not be “paving paradise to put up a parking lot” but it will be important not to sell out for quick cash, as developers will undoubtedly offer the city huge amounts to develop park areas into garages and apartments. The impact of so many apartments and residents on neighborhoods and home values remain to be seen. Will this merely add to delays in getting City services and more traffic, or allow the City to lower taxes?


Your Water Quality

It's a fact often taken for granted. You turn on the faucet and water flows out. But where does your water come from? How is it treated? These questions and more are answered in this Water Quality Report. The Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) requires all community water systems throughout the country, including the City of Wilton Manors, to provide an annual report to its customers of laboratory tests taken throughout the year. Except where indicated otherwise, this report is based on the results of our monitoring for the period of January 1 to December 31, 2021. Data obtained before January 1, 2021, and presented in this report are from the most recent testing done in accordance with the laws, rules, and regulations.

The City of Wilton Manors gets its water from the Fiveash Regional Water Treatment Plant operated by the City of Fort Lauderdale. Wells in the Prospect and Peele-Dixie Wellfields draw water from the Biscayne Aquifer, an underground water supply, which is the sole source of our drinking water. Our water is obtained from these ground water sources and is chlorinated for disinfection purposes and then fluoridated for dental health purposes.

After water is drawn from the Biscayne Aquifer, it goes through several treatment processes including lime softening, fluoridation, filtering and disinfection to ensure that the water is suitable for drinking, cooking and cleaning. The water is routinely tested and monitored in state-certified laboratories to ensure its quality and safety before being pumped through miles of water mains to your faucet.

Drinking Water Sources and Contaminants: The sources of drinking water (both tap water and bottled water) include rivers, lakes, streams, ponds, reservoirs, springs, and wells. As water travels over the surface of the land or through the ground, it dissolves naturally occurring minerals and, in some cases, radioactive material, and can pick up substances resulting from the presence of animals or from human activity. Contaminants that may be present in source water include:

- **Microbial contaminants**, such as viruses and bacteria, which may come from sewage treatment plants, septic systems, agricultural livestock operations, and wildlife.
- **Inorganic contaminants**, such as salts and metals, which can be naturally-occurring or result from urban stormwater runoff, industrial or domestic wastewater discharges, oil and gas production, mining or farming.
- **Pesticides and herbicides**, which may come from a variety of sources such as agriculture, urban stormwater runoff, and residential uses.
- **Organic chemical contaminants**, including synthetic and volatile organic chemicals, which are by-products of industrial processes and petroleum production, and also can come from gas stations, urban stormwater runoff, and septic systems.
- **Radioactive contaminants**, which can be naturally occurring or be the result of oil and gas production and mining activities.

To ensure that tap water is safe to drink, the EPA prescribes regulations, which limit the amount of certain contaminants in water provided by public water systems. The Food and Drug Administration (FDA) regulations establish limits for contaminants in bottled water, which must provide the same protection for public health.

Drinking water, including bottled water, may reasonably be expected to contain at least small amounts of some contaminants. The presence of contaminants does not necessarily indicate that the water poses a health risk. More information about contaminants and potential health effects can be obtained by calling the Environmental Protection Agency's Safe Drinking Water Hotline at 1-800-426-4791.

Health Information: Some people may be more vulnerable to contaminants in drinking water than the general population. Immuno-compromised persons such as persons with cancer undergoing chemotherapy, persons who have undergone organ transplants, people with HIV/AIDS or other immune system disorders, some elderly, and infants can be particularly at risk from infections. These people should seek advice about drinking water from their health care providers. EPA/Center for Disease Control (CDC) guidelines on appropriate means to lessen the risk of infection by Cryptosporidium and other microbiological contaminants are available from the Safe Drinking Water Hotline at: 1-800-426-4791.

If present, elevated levels of lead can cause serious health problems, especially for pregnant women and young children. Lead in drinking water is primarily from materials and components associated with service lines and home plumbing. The City of Wilton Manors is responsible for providing high quality drinking water, but cannot control the variety of materials used in plumbing components. When your water has been sitting for several hours, you can minimize the potential for lead exposure by flushing your tap for 30 seconds to 2 minutes before using water for drinking or cooking. If you are concerned about lead in your water, you may wish to have your water tested. Retail Development on the "Old Dixie Highway"

In 1926, E.J. Willingham envisioned Wilton Drive to be upscale residential and the Dixie Highway as commercial. It didn't turn out that way. By the mid-1940s, Al Hagen, Clayton Leaver, Lamar Braddy, and others had built retail space on Wilton Drive. However, but for Red's Bar and a vegetable stand at Five Points, Dixie Highway had to wait more than ten years for retail development. Barton & Miller Cleaners arrived in 1956; followed by the "Dixie Shopping Center" (below) opening in 1958. The center was anchored by a 28,000 s.f. Grand Union—the largest supermarket in the county; and Eagle Army-Navy—a fast-growing, self-service department store chain. A year after opening, the Grand Union was sold and converted to Publix.

City Charter Amendments Will Appear on Your November 8 General Election Ballot

Please review the charter amendment questions before you vote to determine if you will answer yes or no to each question.

CHARTER AMENDMENT QUESTION 1

REPEAL OBSOLETE ARTICLES IIIA, SECTIONS 14 AND 22, ARTICLES V AND XII.

Shall Article IIIA, Section 14 of the City Charter providing for a City Treasurer, and Section 22 providing for a transitional City Commission in 1985, and Article V of the City Charter providing that the City Clerk shall be the City's tax collector and collect local business taxes, and Article XII providing for a Civil Service Board, all be repealed in their entirety as obsolete?

CHARTER AMENDMENT QUESTION 2

FORFEITURE OF OFFICE; FILLING OF VACANCIES FOR OFFICE OF MAYOR AND CITY COMMISSION

Shall Article IIIA, Section 5 of the City Charter be Amended to Delete the Provision Authorizing the City Commission to Declare a Forfeiture in the Office of Mayor or Commissioner; and to Amend the Provisions For Filling Vacancies in the Office of Mayor and City Commission?

CHARTER AMENDMENT QUESTION 3

TERM LIMITS FOR COMMISSIONERS AND MAYOR

Shall Article IIIA of the City Charter be amended to provide term limits of twelve (12) years for mayor and commissioners; specifically, a limit of three (3) four (4) year terms for commissioners; and a limit of six (6) two (2) year terms for mayor?

ELECTION VOTING SCHEDULE

Primary early voting is from August 13 to 21, 2022, from 10 a.m. to 7 p.m. at the Woman's Club for the Tuesday, August 23, 2022 Primary election (vote at your designated precinct if voting on election day, 7a.m.– 7p.m.)

General Election early voting is from October 24 to November 6, 2022, from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. at the Woman's Club for the November 8, 2022 General Election (vote at your designated precinct if voting on election day, 7a.m.—7p.m.).

From Chief Gary Blocker Retaining Qualified Staffing To Support The Level Of Service You Deserve

In our never-ending endeavor to provide public safety services to our city, we remain committed to achieving our goal of recruiting and retaining the most qualified police officers to serve you. Nationwide, agencies have been impacted by police officer staffing shortages during an era noted as the “great resignation.” Our police department, and others in Broward County, have experienced the same challenges with achieving and sustaining full staffing. We are happy to report that as of June 2022, and pursuant to our aggressive recruitment efforts, we have a full complement of police officers. Saying this, 2021 was a different story. Our agency faced staffing shortages to the tune of being 21% understaffed with officers, a shortage we never want to face again. Although understaffed, our agency remained committed to achieving our daily public safety missions. During this time, our officers worked extra shifts, were mandated to stay late and come in early, and at times were compelled to abandon days off in order to meet minimum mandatory staffing levels. It was amazing to watch our officers ensure our community did not go unprotected during these challenging times, and I am very appreciative to them for placing our Island City first.



Along with this gratitude comes concern for the health and well-being of our officers under times of such duress. In order to ensure we are providing a high “Quality of Work Life” environment, our agency provides a supportive and interactive work environment for employees to thrive and achieve the most out of their careers we can offer. A respectful workplace culture for our employees is a priority as this is high on the list of what someone desires from their employer. Also high on the list of importance is what Forbes notes as physical, psychological, and financial wellness. For many years, our agency has promoted good physical health and mental wellness by enacting initiatives and mental health and stress management teams to support our officers. Where our city currently seeks marked improvement, is in the area of financial wellness. Knowing our city employees were underpaid, our city embarked on a salary study that showed the shortfall in employee salaries that included low police officer salaries. A separate study I commissioned showed our police officers are the lowest paid in Broward County.

First and foremost, this “last place” designator is not reflective of the “first place” passion and love they exhibit while serving our community. Second, when looking to retain employees we have trained, professionally developed, and invested a lot of time and money in, our current salary structure has failed us. Accompanying the 79% staffing levels in 2021 was the fact that 43% of our employees who left said they were parting ways for better salaries and benefits elsewhere. Additional data points from my study also noted on average, our officers’ starting and top-out salaries are 12% and 9% less than other Broward agencies. In addition, 59% of Broward agencies’ salaries surpass ours by 10% or more, with four of these agencies making 20% more than our officers.

As our city continues the path toward improving employee salaries, I want to thank and commend city leadership for embarking on this necessary mission. First and foremost, we owe it to our employees to compensate them for the excellent services they provide to our community. Secondly, we must remain competitive in our city’s endeavor to recruit and retain the right people who will exhibit passion for their profession and conduct their duties with compassion for those they serve. To our community...I ask for your support during our drive toward fair and competitive salaries. I am certain this path can lead us to being fiscally responsible with your tax dollars while at the same time maintaining and sustaining a passionate workforce that stays here in our Island City to serve you with a goal of meeting or exceeding the levels of service you deserve.

Beware of Summer Scams

The scammers aren't taking the summer off. Con artists and fraudsters have a litany of scams that they are just waiting to unleash on unsuspecting Americans who can't wait to leave their houses as travel restrictions relax across the country. Be on the lookout for these summer scams:

Disappearing vacation rentals:

Scammers capitalize on the popularity of vacation properties rented out on legit sites like Airbnb and Vrbo (Vacation Rentals by Owner) by offering online, or via social media, properties that don't exist, don't belong to them, or don't measure up to the gorgeous photos.

Avoid this scam: Keep all of your interactions

with a vacation property's owners on the website of legitimate companies. A request to take your conversation off the site is a sign of a likely scam. If a property has few reviews or seems too good to be true, search the address online, or check it on Google Maps.

Rental-car cons:

Several travelers alerted AARP this spring to fake rental-car-company scams. Crooks set up phony customer service numbers online that look just like those of major rental-car companies. When you call, they take your money and personal information, then leave you stranded.

Avoid this scam: Before you call or click to reserve a car, verify that you're calling the real customer service department or that you're on a legitimate rental-car-company website.


Message from Central Area Neighborhood Association (CANA)

The Wilton Drive Improvement District (WDID) was created by the Wilton Manors City Commission in December 2014 to work to create a cleaner, safer and more attractive Wilton Drive. The Wilton Drive Improvement District is a dependent special district of the City of Wilton Manors, and as such is subject to the requirements of Florida Statutes Chapter 189.

The District Board is comprised of seven members appointed at large by the City Commission. Ordinance 2014-0011 which dictates the composition of the Board – three individuals who own property on Wilton Drive within the District, three individuals who own businesses in the District, and one resident. The recent WDID Property Owner Newsletter issued by WDID Chair Anthony LoGrande reported that The Wilton Drive Improvement District has been engaged in a digital advertising campaign designed to increase brand awareness and business on Wilton Drive, and the campaign has shown some very positive results, including a higher than average click through rate. We know that digital content that includes video increases the numbers, and our recent campaigns have been quite successful. The newsletter also included updates on other subjects related to their core mission, which includes three main areas of focus:

SAFETY—WDID has had ongoing conversations with the Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT), who has jurisdiction over Wilton Drive, to advocate for additional lighting, crosswalks, and increased parking.

MARKETING—WDID continues to support city events with more funding than ever before. They advocate for underground gas lines to help develop our restaurants, hardening of utilities for climate resiliency and future mixed use development, and work with the Wilton Manors Economic Development Manager in retaining and recruiting new business in our City.

BEAUTIFICATION—Our landscaping plan with approximately 60 new shade trees is fully funded, and the contract for the irrigation and plant material has been awarded. Expect the landscaping to be in by end of summer. WDID has a strategy plan for bicycle racks and trash bins, but needs to develop the funding plan. In the meantime, WDID has funded and will soon install a bicycle “self-repair” station near the City Hall Parking Lot.
